such as:


- Odes

Stationary Stationery

One of the many skills we want our rangitahi to master before they embark on life outside of Primary School is the ability to manage themselves and their learning equipment. We are working on this with the children, but at the moment there are some pupils without the basic equipment for learning. Every child needs a small pencil case containing: 2x pencils, a blue pen, and a red pen. A 15cm ruler is a bonus. Over the term break please check in with your child that they have these necessities.



Maths

We are currently learning about Probability! If you are keen to support your child with maths at home, some of the topics we are focusing on are: *Probability trees, Theoretical probability, Experimental probability, Decimals/fractions/percentages.* These topics and others are available on Maths Whizz and EP which we expect students to be working on at home for 30 minutes a week. Boardgames and card games are also a great way for kids to learn aspects of probability, and are likely more fun than an online learning tool... We look forward to hearing about any Monopoly tournaments!



Imagined creatures Sgraffito

As part of our Science learning this term, Māia students have been considering the future of the Earth and the changes that are happening to our planet. In thinking about the emergence of potential new species, or the adaptations current species may need to survive, tamariki in Māia designed their own imagined creatures. We are now working on our artist impressions of what these creatures will look like, using the sgraffito technique of layering crayons and scratching back through the surface to reveal the colours, contrast and texture within.
