Tamariki have already begun training and building their running stamina in the build-up to our whole kura cross country and fun run. Staffing Update

At the beginning of this year, Ella became Miss Ayto and began studying to be a teacher, so we had two learning assistant (LA) vacancies. I am pleased to share that we have employed two learning assistants, Anna Mahon and Mckenzie Anderson. Both have experience working with tamariki and are excited to work with our creative tamariki. They will interact with a range of ākonga across the kura, including out in the playground.

As our new entrant tamariki arrive over the year, we start a roll growth team each year, dependent on these numbers. We will be starting a new home learning team in term 2. We have appointed an experienced junior teacher, Jackie Lay, to start at the beginning of term two. Jackie comes to us with years of junior literacy experience and is ready to start in the team with her knowledge of BSLA (Better Start Literacy Approach).

For those who know Greta, our release teacher from last year, you will know she has had her pēpē. Beautiful Zoe arrived on 21 December in a rush, before Greta and JT could make it to the hospital, but they were all safe and healthy. Wee Olive loves her little sister and enjoys helping out.

Whānau Reporting and the Refreshed Curriculum

Kaiako are working hard on the many changes with the refreshed curriculum in structured literacy and the new mathematics programme, 'Maths No Problem'. Currently education is transitioning from the curriculum using levels (Level 1 = years 1 & 2, Level 2 = years 3 & 4, Level 3 = years 5 & 6, Level 4 = year 7 & 8) to the refreshed curriculum using phases (Phase 1 = years 1-3, Phase 2 = years 4 - 6, Phase 3 = 7 & 8). Currently, our whānau reporting aligns with the previous curriculum and levels. Before changing our kura reporting format, we are waiting for guidance from The Ministry. We will keep you updated on this.

Our next opportunity to share ākonga learning is in week 10, our 3-way Learning Conversations & Goal Setting. These hui are ākonga led with kaiako, whānau/parents, to discuss ākonga learning goals in curriculums of English, mathematics, and learnacy (how they learn). These hui are 15 minutes long.

Curriculum Maths Teacher Only Days and End of Year Date

As advised last week as part of our kaiako upskilling in the refreshed mathematics curriculum, the Minister of Education has provided two days this year and two days next year for us to do so. Our kura will be meeting with Northland and Wadestown Kura to do this, therefore, our kura will be closed for these days.

- Day 2: Friday 22 August Term 3 Week 6



Movin'March

Ko tā Māehe Haere he whakatairanga i ngā hua o te hīkoikoi, pānukunuku me te kake paiki ki te kura. Movin'March celebrates the benefits of walking, scooting and biking to school.

Greater Wellington encourages kura and whānau across the region to get active to/from kura over March. Our kura participates in this every year as we encourage tamariki to walk, bike, or scoot to kura to promote increased independence, physical and mental health, decision-making, and road safety skills for tamariki - and our kura benefits from less chaos and cars on our surrounding roads. Our rangatahi can take part in the WOW (Walk or Wheel) Passport Challenge, part of a motivator to get them walking or wheeling to kura. To include all our tamariki we encourage whānau who drive to 'Park & Stride', that is to park away from kura so tamariki can walk some distance safely. More information will come from your HLT teachers.

Why did you do that?
Why can't you just do what I ask?
Why can't you be more like your sister?

Why are you like this?
Why don't you ever listen?
Why does this have to be so hard?

Sometimes these questions imply there's something wrong with WHO THEY ARE instead of what they did.

Don't expect your child to know WHY they did something.

Often, they are not developmentally self-aware enough to know the answer.

BUT THEY DO FEEL YOUR FRUSTRATION AND JUDGEMENT AND INTERNALIZE THOSE FEELINGS: "I DON'T KNOW WHY I DID THAT. I ALWAYS DO EVERYTHING WRONG. SOMETHING MUST BE WRONG WITH ME."



NOTICE THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN

JUDGEMENT

Why did you do that?

Why can't you be quiet?

CURIOSITY

It looks like you're feeling very angry about this...is that right?

I can see you're very excited and it's hard to listen to me. Did I get it right?

INSTEAD OF

TRY

"Why did you do that?!"

"I see you are bothering your sister. Do you need help finding something to do?"

"Why are you crying?"

-

"I see you are really upset. I'm here if you need me."

"Why can't you just sit still?!"

"I can see your battery is supercharged right now. Can you wiggle your toes as fast as you can?"

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
