Kāhui Ako Day - Professor Russell Bishop

Thank you for supporting our kura with our Staff Only Day on Friday, we were lucky to have this time to meet as a Kāhui Ako and to have a presentation from Professor Russell Bishop. Professor Russell was an Emeritus Professor of Māori Education in the Faculty of Education at the University of Waikato and is well known for directing the development of Te Kotahitanga, a large New Zealand Ministry of Education-funded research and professional development project. This project demonstrated how kaiako and other kura leaders could improve the educational achievement of Māori tamariki in mainstream classrooms by implementing a culturally responsive pedagogy of relations.

Professor Russell's research aligns closely with the relational approach we take here at our kura: Learning as interaction; teachers create learning cultures with their tamariki where relationships and reciprocity are foregrounded, along with the multiple literacies to support them.

Learning Support in Whānui

The home learning teams have increased in size compared to last year in Whānui, and after discussions with whānau and the Board of Trustees (BoT), we have put in an additional learning assistant to support learning in the team. I want to acknowledge the positive mahi of Rebekah and Hugo with their teams. We are making this change to support their good work. We thank the BoT for their proactive support.

The BoT asked me to mention how much it relies on whānau donations when considering requests for additional support in the classroom. Making your donation gives the BoT the ability to fund these types of requests to support the tamariki and teachers beyond what the government baseline funding allows. Thank you to those who have been able to make a donation this year; it really does make a difference to what the school can offer.

Starlight Counselling Services

What has been happening in Whānui?

Masks of Many

In our arts and social science unit, we have explored the varying roles masks had across different cultural traditions, celebrations and performances. The children created their own masks, sculpting features which they then paper-mached over. They then decorated these with paint and/or Sharpie. The results were distinctive and colourful. Children wrote about their masks and how they might be used. They had fun discussing what the masks represented. This included how, when and why they were worn and how they might transform the wearer. Enjoy a few examples of our childrens' masks and the stories behind them.

The Toundre Mask is an ancient artefact that was found by the leader of Slovakia. The Toundre Mask was from the Temple of Mongolia but in the 1840's it was discovered and brought to Slovakia. This ancient artefact was used to ward off war, and till today it still does. - Ruby

This mask is used for intimidation. It weirds them out and intimidates them so much that they die. It is also bullet-proof. - Miles

My mask was made for insulting enemy tribes via the mouth so big there's no room for a brain. There are also ancient roasts inscribed on the back for the wearer to yell. - Issac

This mask was worn by the women of England in the 1800s. There was a group of ladies that had created a women's rights protest group in the year 1805. People hated them, and if they were recognised by police, they would go to prison. So, they wore a disguise, which was this colourful patterned mask. - Izzie G

The mask was passed down through generations, until a god named Trinca was told to put a spell on it so the wearer becomes invisible. He was the god of mischief. - Giancarlo

This mask is a decoration. It represents joy and helpfulness. The reason why the artist did yellow skin was because it was the colour of the sun and everyone thought the sun brings joy. - April

Ogerpons mask is a legendary mask that possesses the blood moon. It instantly knocks out pokemon. If you put it on, you can possess people's minds. - Ewan

These types of masks are known for their cracks, colours, and lack of features. They are worn when there has been no rain for a long time and water is scarce. - Willa

Parking - Kowhai Road Quick Stop Zone

Please do not leave your car unattended in this zone. It is a quick drop off or pick up - tamariki need to be able to get in and out of your car unassisted. If the zone is full you will need to exit Kowhai Road and try again or park further away and walk back to school. Do not stop on the broken yellow lines.

Please do not park in front of the garages on Boundary Road. We have received complaints from neighbours who regularly have their vehicles blocked in by parents who have parked in front of their garages.

Security Cameras

Please be aware that security cameras are operating on school grounds to deter and investigate any vandalism to school property and other antisocial or illegal activity. The cameras are not operating inside school buildings and are programmed to only record activity outside of school hours.

Movin'March

Movin'March celebrates the benefits of walking, scooting and biking to school.

Greater Wellington encourages kura and whānau across the region to get active to/from kura over March. Our kura participates in this every year as we encourage tamariki to walk, bike, or scoot to kura to promote increased independence, physical and mental health, decision-making, and road safety skills for tamariki - and our kura benefits from less chaos and cars on our surrounding roads. Our rangatahi can take part in the WOW (Walk or Wheel) Passport Challenge, part of a motivator to get them walking or wheeling to kura. To include all our tamariki we encourage whānau who drive to 'Park & Stride', that is to park away from kura so tamariki can walk some distance safely.
