E.O.T.C

With Māia back at kura after their exciting EOTC week, we have Whānui setting out on their EOTC adventures! Today, they will venture to the Petone Settlers Museum and beach; tomorrow, they will explore Matiu Island, and on Wednesday, they will walk through the Waimaphihi Reserve to visit the Brooklyn Gun emplacement. Thank you to Rebekah and Hugo for their mahi planning these adventures and to our supportive whānau joining in on the fun this week.

Pükengatanga

Pūkengatanga is one of our school's key values. Pūkengatanga challenges us to pursue excellence in all our activities. We encourage our tamariki to learn purposefully, challenge themselves, and do their best. We take a strength-based approach: Our children come to kura with so much they can already do and this is the starting point for a new journey. Whatever they can do, they can do better; having a "can-do attitude" and using positive language is vital for success. We frame this approach of growth in learning capacity and knowledge with a learning language, for example, by using yet at the end of a sentence. "I can't swim a length of the pool, yet."; "I don't know my 6 timetables, yet.".

Since everyone has different strengths and learns at different rates, it is important that tamariki think of their successes and difficulties as steps in their own learning journeys. It isn't helpful to compare yourself to others in a negative way. Positive self-talk builds resilience, the resilience that makes the most of mistakes and doubts. Listening to others actively can help us adopt new perspectives and appreciate what quality work looks like. We

share aspirations and successes in various contexts, at kura and at home. All these considerations contribute to a culture of excellence. To see Pūkengatanga in action, check out our Ara updates below from Tupu and Māia. This is all linked to how and why we have our 3-Way Learning Conversations and Goal Setting.

3-way Learning Conversations and Goal Setting

Our 3-way Learning Conversations and Goal Review will be held in Week 10. These will be held across three evenings: Tuesday, 8th April from 3.20 pm to 4.50 pm, Wednesday, 9 April from 3.20 pm to 6.05 pm and Thursday, 10 April from 3.20 pm to 6.05 pm. There are some variations of times and days for some staff members, Libya Munn will hold hers earlier. We think the best way to strengthen ākonga learning power is to include the learner at the centre of these conversations as they learn to take responsibility and develop agency as learners. This dialogue is crucial to developing the triangle of ākonga, kaiako, and whānau - learners, teacher, and family. Kura Whānau Group - all welcome!

Amy, one of our whānau, had a great idea to start a Kura Whānau group for all who are interested in learning about and supporting tikanga, matauranga, me te reo Māori at Ngā Tātarakihi o Ahumairangi Kura (Kelburn Normal). They aim to foster a strong sense of community through whakawhanaungatanga: valuing and honoring each person as they are, and where they are.

Hui (meetings) will provide an opportunity to come together, learn, and practise te reo and tikanga— including mihi, pepeha, karakia, and waiata. No prior knowledge is needed—just enthusiasm!

Our first session in term two will focus on: Mihi mihi, and aspirations for the group, our kura, and future learning. Confirmation of dates will come in the next newsletter.

Blake Virtual Reality

As part of our senior area (years 5-8) EOTC this Thursday, tamariki get to experience the wonder of underwater Aotearoa through virtual reality!

Partnering with New Zealand Geographic, NZ-VR shares a virtual reality programme which showcases underwater sites around Aotearoa and aims to connect and inspire students to care for the ocean and environment. NZ-VR educators will be on hand with a class-set of virtual reality headsets, delivering an engaging, inspiring, and

educational one-hour session to tamariki.

Tamariki experience a number of underwater virtual reality experiences that compare and contrast pristine marine environments with degraded ones; they learn about what causes this damage, as well as what actions can be taken to show kaitiakitanga (guardianship) and protect the marine environment.

Cross Country & Fun Run Update

Our whole kura Cross Country and Fun Run is happening next Wednesday (**March 26th**) at Karori Park. This event encourages tamariki to challenge themselves, build stamina and enjoy being active.

What's the latest update from the Tupu team?






In Tupu Tahi mathematics this week, we had a teddy bear picnic where

we equally shared everything needed for a delicious picnic. There were plates, knives and forks, cups and bowls and even fruit and treats. We had to work with our maths buddy to problem-solve how to share not only equipment but also our thoughts and ideas to problem-solve.

Tupu Toru loved blasting off into space for our topic. We have been enjoying learning about the solar system. Here is some artwork we have created. We did Marama and Ra inspired by '*How Maui Slowed the Sun'* and we also made some cool moons by using salt on PVA glue and then painting



on the craters using watered down paint.

Tupu Rua has enjoyed their pattern-making in mathematics. We have used all kinds of interesting things, from musical instruments, handprints and even magic beans. Patterns are everywhere.

EOTC WEEK!

This week, we have been enjoying our Education Outside the Classroom activities. Team building, rock climbing, botany, sport, Matiu Island, art gallery visits, and lots of opportunities for reflective discussion and team building. EOTC is an opportunity to explore learning in a range of contexts and reinforce the message that learning can happen anywhere, anytime!

On our trip to Matiu Island we saw dolphins, seals, a tree weta, and many native birds. Zoë, the DOC ranger, generously volunteered her time to speak to us about the fascinating history of the island. She answered many pātai about rats, seeds, quarantine, and gun implacements. We are so fortunate to have these wonderful opportunities right on our doorstep.

Te Reo Māori

Matua Jason has been discussing with Māia the history of the flags that have been increasingly visible in recent years: Te Whakaminenga o nga Hapu o Nu Tireni (also known as Te Kara) and the more recent Tino Rangatiratanga flag. Te Kara was the flag that represented the northern rangatira who went on to sign He Whakaputanga o te Rangatiratanga o Nu Tireni, the Declaration of Independence of the United Tribes of New Zealand, which took place five years prior to the signing of Te Tiriti o Waitangi. Matua Jason shared his experience of being at Waitangi in 1990 when the Tino Rangatiratanga flag was unveiled.

Māia have also been consolidating their kupu Māori (vocabulary) by creating games. We have looked at things like board games, flash cards, memory games and matching games as ways to practice vocabulary, and students are working to create their own games that they and others can use.



Science

Do plants grow better when you play them music by Drake? Do seeds germinate if they have been burnt or crushed? Will a protein shake make plants stronger? If these are the questions that have been keeping you awake at night, you will be relieved to know that our students are researching the answers. Ellie and Mikayla were excited to note that one of their bean seeds had germinated despite being cut in half. A cacophony of pop songs is currently being played to reluctant seeds, we will keep you posted on our results.

We have a small but brilliant team of parents who have been helping us, though many hands make light work. Parking - Kowhai Road Quick Stop Zone - Please do not leave your car unattended in this zone. It is a quick drop off or pick up - tamariki need to be able to get in and out of your car unassisted. If the zone is full you will need to exit Kowhai Road and try again or park further away and walk back to school. Do not stop on the broken yellow lines.

Parking on Boundary Rd ~ Please do not park in front of the garages on Boundary Road. We have received complaints from neighbours who regularly have their vehicles blocked in by parents who have parked in front of their garages.

Security Cameras - Please be aware that security cameras are operating on school grounds to deter and investigate any vandalism to school property and other antisocial or illegal activity. The cameras are not operating inside school buildings and are programmed to only record activity outside of school hours.

Movin'March

Ko tā Māehe Haere he whakatairanga i ngā hua o te hīkoikoi, pānukunuku me te kake paiki ki te kura. Movin'March celebrates the benefits of walking, scooting and biking to school.

Greater Wellington encourages kura and whānau across the region to get active to/from kura over March. Our kura participates in this every year as we encourage tamariki to walk, bike, or scoot to kura to promote increased independence, physical and mental health, decision-making, and road safety skills for tamariki - and our kura benefits from less chaos and cars on our surrounding roads. Our rangatahi can take part in the WOW (Walk or Wheel) Passport Challenge, part of a motivator to get them walking or wheeling to kura. To include all our tamariki we encourage whānau who drive to 'Park & Stride', that is to park away from kura so tamariki can walk some distance safely.
