This year Arlo and Fiona spoke to the year 8s at the final assembly and I was struck by how well they had encapsulated this group and our manaakitanga at Kelburn. Some people advocate to achieve order through control, systems and structure. At Kelburn we aim to drive our culture through natural leadership, quality relationships, high expectations and a children's community that cares for all...a tuakana teina approach. Here are their words about how the year 8s nurtured them ...

Arlo: School had just begun. We walked into the Maia space not fully realizing that this year would become both the most enjoyable and challenging year we'd had so far. I remember the first time I walked into Maia, just before school ended in late 2023. We had just found out about our classes. I was feeling nervous and unsure of what to expect. But within minutes, those nerves turned into pure excitement. The Year 8s, who had been here for a while already, were so welcoming and kind, and they made me feel at home straight away. It's crazy to think that just a couple months ago we were the nervous newcomers, and now, here we are, ready to move up ourselves.

Fiona: Looking back, it's hard to believe how far we've come since those early days. The first few weeks were full of awkward introductions and unfamiliar faces. But, slowly, we started to build friendships, find our place, and really get to know one another. It's funny how, over time, the people who once felt like strangers now feel like family. Watching the Year 8s leave Kelburn is a bit bittersweet. It's hard to imagine school without them, especially because they've been such a big part of making this year so memorable.

Arlo: The impact the Year 8s have had on the school is huge. Even though they're a smaller group, they've shown all of us what it means to be a part of a community. Whether it was helping with school events, guiding us through tricky situations, or simply spending time together, their presence has been felt in every corner of Kelburn. Their energy, their teamwork, and their kindness have set a standard that we can only hope to live up to in the years to come. We've all learned something from them, whether it's how to work together or how to be a good friend.

Fiona: As they prepare to leave, it's clear that the Year 8s have left a lasting mark on this school. They've not only made our time here better, but they've also taught us what it means to be kind, supportive, and involved. We may not always realize it, but their example has shaped our journey in ways we'll carry with us for years to come. So, while we say goodbye, we also say thank you. For everything they've done, for the memories they've created, and for the inspiration they've given us. We'll do our best to carry that spirit forward and make them proud.

To finish ... I am so proud of our team for what we all do at Kelburn - one of the things I am most proud of is being the Tumuaki that ushered in our school name Ngā Tātarakihi o Ahumairangi. The honour of being given a name by Te Atiawa, a name that connects us to Parihaka - 'the sound of the cicada basking in the sun at Ahumairangi'...or in Parihaka terms - the sound that children make at play. To have kaumatua Kura Moeahu connect the essence of Kelburn, our mana, to the beautiful sounds we make in the Arts at Kelburn is a privilege that I'm not sure we as a community understand or value enough. Our school name is not focused on our location, our name reflects our tamariki and their aroha for each other. I think that is really special cause that to me is what Kelburn has.
